



### LAKOTA YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CAMP // Herrick

Guests will learn about the Rosebud Reservation's first established community, Milk's Camp, from a life-long resident of the area. Enjoy tradtional storytelling from a Lakota elder and a performace from Lakota youth of their original play "Peji Oyanka" and an indigneous plant wallk. Experience the Wounded Knee Memorial with Tatanka Rez Tours. The Wounded Knee Massacre of 1890 marked the end of the Indian wars. This event and others like it across the nation were detrimental to the Lakota people.

RED CLOUD HERITAGE CENTER, SCHOOL & HISTORICAL CEMETERY // Pine Ridge

One of the earliest cultural centers and museums located on an Indian reservation in the US, The Heritage Center represents the rich heritage of North America's Native community. The skill and creativity that remain mainstays of the local Lakota and other Native American cultures can be learned of at the center.

ST. CHARLES BORROMEO CATHOLIC CHURCH // St. Francis

The century-old Romanesque church with its unique design incorporating Lakota symbols and Germanic carpentry. Connections will be made to the church's controversial past bringing to light the national reckoning of Indian Boarding Schools.



BUECHEL MEMORIAL LAKOTA MU-SEUM // St. Francis

Guests will be guided through the museum's collection of over 2,000 historic artifacts and photographs from the Rosebud Reservation honoring the Sicangu Lakota Oyate traditions and culture.


